

Tanner Lange – Recipient of COPR's PCP Award of Excellence for 2022



The COPR 2022 PCP Award of Excellence goes to Tanner Lange with a score of 795 out of 800. Tanner Lange grew up in the small town of Cabri, Saskatchewan and moved to Swift Current, Saskatchewan with his mom and older sister at the age of 12. After graduating from high school, Tanner pursued a Bachelor of Education degree from the University of Regina and convocated in 2015, after which he began a teaching career at Maverick school in Swift Current working with at-risk youth. At the age of 27, he reached out to a former hockey coach and went for a tour of the Swift Current Fire Hall. During the tour, it became readily apparent to me that I had a passion for Fire and Emergency Services. I was hired by my hometown fire department in April 2021.

Tanner completed the Primary Paramedic Program, a part-time program in Swift Current at Great Plains College which was brokered through Sask Polytech, in June 2022, graduating with Great Distinction. He was also the recipient of Great Plains' Academic Achievement award. Although it was a challenge being in the program while working full-time and having a young family at home, Tanner is very grateful for how it all played out, as he was able to

continue living at home, spending more time with family than if he had moved away to attend school. Throughout this program, he developed a very keen interest in pathophysiology and pharmacology, spending a great deal of time conceptualizing material, and doing what he could to ensure he truly understood the "how" and "why" instead of memorizing facts from the textbooks. To do so, he would often approach his instructors with his queries, and they were always more than willing to help or, at least, have a conversation about the question to try and establish an appropriate answer. He would also utilize other resources in pursuit of the answers he was looking for. Tanner believes these resources contributed greatly to his success and he would like to thank his instructors for their patience and their willingness to share their knowledge.

Outside of working, Tanner keeps busy and loves spending time with his family outdoors, whether it be hiking, camping, campfires, picnics, or playing sports. He has played hockey his entire life and likes golfing during the summers. He also plays guitar and enjoys home renovations.

In addition to his instructors, Tanner would like to thank the Swift Current Fire Department for accommodating his schedule and providing him with time away from work when it conflicted with school, which allowed him to maintain his priority of success in the PCP program and COPR exam. level of training. In 2022, He completed the part-time EMR program with the Alberta Health and Safety Training Institute (AHASTI) located in Calgary. He is excited to engage in the new skills and knowledge he acquired during his time at school.

Wyatt has since moved on from ski patrol and has re-focused his career path towards firefighting. Today, he currently practices as an EMR with the Canmore Fire Rescue Service. He joined the department as a paid-on-call responder and truly believes it's the best job he's ever had. In between paid on-call firefighting, he fills his time with other work including industrial rope access, and industrial standby rescue. Wyatt enjoys the varied work but his goal is set to attain a full-time career in the fire service.
